What do I have to do in the audition?

- 1. Students will take part in a warm-up exercise with Miss Chadwick.
- 2. For speaking roles please prepare, in advance of the audition, <u>one</u> of the roles using one of the following extracts. You may rehearse as a pair/trio, or you can practise alone and we can pair you up at the audition. For smaller or non-speaking roles please prepare the roles of Tram Passengers. All roles are non-gender specific.

What is expected of me when learning the duologue?

Try and learn the dialogue for your character (please email Miss Chadwick if you are unsure) but also try and practise using vocal and physical skills to show the audience how your character is feeling. Larger speaking roles will go to those who have made an outstanding effort to really learn the lines, create a character, react well to others on the day and use the space effectively.

Please could you complete and bring with you the form at the end of the audition pack indicating which roles you are interested in – see character list on p1 and2.

terrible place. Have pity!

> Emil Who did you think was after you, Mr Snow?

Mr Snow Unfortunately there are those who object to

my hard work in the financial sector.

Well, my mother works hard in the Emil

hairdressing sector. She earned that money

you stole.

In the financial sector, it is considered bad Mr Snow

manners to call what we do stealing.

Emil In your world isn't there a difference between

right and wrong?

My world? What about your world, Emil Mr Snow

Tischbein? What does Chief Constable Jeschke

have to say about right and wrong?

That's different. It was a joke! I never meant— Emil

Hush, I understand. Honestly, I do. We are not Mr Snow

so different. It's rare that I meet someone who

impresses me as much as I do myself.

I'm not like you. Emil

I had a mother. I know you have a mother. I Mr Snow

saw her at the station, looking rather sad.

Don't talk about her. Emil

Let us make a deal. You want this envelope Mr Snow

from me? In return, I ask—

What? Emil
